




very appropriate for Good Friday.












### **ACROSS THE NULLABOR PLAIN**

Great weather, and with no danger of wildlife we sat on 105 kph. Lunch at Cocklebiddy, temperature nudging 30 degrees, so the lovely cool air coming out of the Blow Hole at Caiguna was very welcome. Our overnight stop was at Fraser Range Station, where we saw a **Big Metal Detector**. The next morning we were off still heading west to Norseman then south to Esperance. We had some car trouble today, which required us to put on the spare electric fuel pump, which worked fine. We also changed the spark plugs, which had become carbed up (maybe due to fuel problem) then the battery packed up (getting old) then the starter button shorted out. All sorted out in Caravan Park in Esperance.

















We toured the Port of Esperance, a great tour run by the local Apex club at \$5 per head, and, also travelled out to the beautiful beaches in Cape Le Grand National Park.

We left Esperance on April 8th, another hot day. We stopped at Ravensthorpe for cool drinks and icy poles, (oh and by the way, in a moment of madness, whilst camped at Esperance, I put the spare diaphragm and pump kit in the mechanical fuel pump, and, reinstalled it!). In the heat and with the added problem of poor octane fuel, the pump stopped working as we left Ravensthorpe, so out it came, and, in went the electric pump again, swearing' that never again will I trust the old style mechanical fuel pump'. Our overnight stop was at Wave Rock near Hyden. We saw the sun rise from the top of the rock, simply beautiful, and, definitely worth the extra kilometres On the road by 9a.m and headed for Albany, car running well despite the 39 degree heat!, but a nice 22 degrees in Albany. We camped at Emu Park Caravan Park for a few nights. Whilst in Albany we had an aluminium plate made (to fit where mechanical fuel pump had been) at Albany Engineering Company. Peter Bassell, (the proprietor) only wanted \$10 for the job, however we insisted on more, and finally settled on \$25, which went into the staff social fund. Peter is a truly good engineer he even offered the use of his home garage and hoist if needed. We also purchased a spare electric fuel pump in Albany (just in case!) We visited Two Peoples Bay National Park and Torndirrup National Park. Lovely coastline and beaches and spent guite a few hours touring around Whale World Australia's Last Whaling Station, now a museum.



















Friday 12th, on the move westward again travelling to Denmark for lunch then onto the Valley of the Giants and the Tree Top Walk, then Walpole and Coal Bay Caravan Park for the night. Fished and walked and shared our camp spot with local very quiet Kangaroos. Saturday saw us travelling along some beautiful forest roads, visiting the Gloucester Tree in Pemberton. Onto Augusta, our most south westerly point of the trip.




Our 2 night stay over, and, at 8.30 Monday morning saw us heading back to the coast, In perfect TR weather, and roads. We arrived in Geraldton, set up camp, then visited the "HMAS Sydney" Memorial, shopped and toured about. A latish start and off towards Kalbarri, along some stunning coastline, overnight at Kalbarri which is situated at the mouth of the Murchison River.

Wednesday morning we headed for Monkey Mia. Temperatures on the rise, and, we put sun screen roof up. Monkey Mia is lovely, but, very crowded and commercial. The camp ground had Emus wandering about, so one had to be careful not to leave anything lying about! We fed the Dolphins and caught some nice sand Whiting. Whilst fishing a mum dolphin and her calf came and took at look at Bob and scrounge for a feed, a very close up experience. We Attended the dawn service for Anzac Day, a lovely service on the beach.

An early start on Friday, for the run to Carnarvon for our next overnight stop. Took photos of the **BIG SATELLITE DISH** and the **BIG HUMPTY DUMPTY**, and, took advantage of the locally grown fruit and vegetables. Saturday, and, we were off to Coral Bay with a detour to Quobba Blowhole (not blowing!) and, had camp set up by midday. Coral Bay is a very nice place, we fed fish and did a Ningaloo Reef snorkelling dive tour which we thoroughly enjoyed and, even caught a squid for tea. Our next stop was Exmouth, where we camped at the Lighthouse Caravan park, some 17 kilometres north of Exmouth township, a stroll over the sand dunes to a great fishing spot and a couple of nice fish caught for tea .We drove out to Yardi Gorge (where we saw large turtles) and swam at Turquoise Bay. This was our most westerly point of the trip, and an area not to be missed.









## "Closing the Circle"

The "Pool of Remembrance" is the final element of the HMAS Sydney II Memorial.

It is a circle within the circle of the original Memorial, which symbolizes the circle of life and death; the concept of Eternity and Infinite.

It commemorates the Finding of HMAS Sydney II on March 16th 2008.

The form of the Pool, with the circular terracing symbolically "descending down into the depths" evokes the War Grave where the Ship now rests silently on the sea floor 120 nautical miles of Steep Point W.A. It culminates in the black granite shadow pattern circle of 644 Silver Gulls linking to the Wall of Remembrance and the Dome of Souls, the wing tip the final 645th Gull, marking the exact location of the Ship in the granite map of the Pool floor.

It is a place of commemoration, contemplation and peace.

Close by the Waiting Woman waits no more. Now she watches over her loved ones eternally at rest. Her gaze lingers along the exact compass bearing to the Ship as it has since she was placed here before the site of the Sydney was known.

The circle of life and death embodied in the design of the Memorial to HMAS Sydney II has now been closed.































Wednesday 1st May, and a very hot run to Dampier, where we stopped for the night, and visited the RED DOG statue.
